Remember . . .?

Most of us Evansville natives who were teenagers in the 1950s remember the southeast corner of Sixth and Main. Others from that time period may recall similar spots in their hometowns. For you younger folks, this is a history lesson. Sixth and Main was a very popular spot, day and night, because it was a major point of transfer for the city buses. Since most of us rode the bus to school or work, we often changed buses there. A bus ride was such a step up from walking home, which for me was on Weinbach Avenue near the old Vogel School, quite a walk from downtown. Bus fare was a dime, and that included a paper transfer, if needed, which allowed us to ride another bus or buses to our destinations. Directly across the street from the bus stop was Evansville's premier theater--the Loew's Victory, currently the Victory. Just south of the theater was a Planters Peanut store--doors open wide with the freshly roasted peanut smell always in the air. Across from the peanut store were two popular shopping points, Neisner's and Woolworth's Five-and-Dime. At the bus stop was the Wax Works record store, the best place to buy the latest 45s or the newest tune on the hit parade. Also, at this corner was the Lib's downtown candy store. It was too enticing. The very finest chocolates were on display, but the real traffic stopper was the automated taffy puller, with its mesmerizing stretching of that day's flavor of delicious taffy. Standing there for fifteen to thirty minutes, salivating for the candy but with just enough money for the bus ride home, was pure torture.

When at last the bus arrived and we boarded, dropping in our dimes or tokens, we were on our way. Those were the days--or were they??

Executive Board Meeting

August 2, 2018

<u>Call to Order</u>: President Walt Lewis called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. at American Baptist East Church and welcomed board members. In addition to the president, the following were in attendance: Doris Beard, Terry Becker, Brenda Beeler, Darlene Brockriede, Fred Bullinger, Pat Claybaugh, Steve Fritz, Judy Isaac, Diana Luck, Diane Meier, Don Mosbey, Fred Naab, Darla Olberding, David Pfettscher, Donna Schmidt, Sandra Schmidt, and Lino Wiseman.

<u>Approval of May 10, 2018, Executive Board Minutes</u>: The minutes were accepted as corrected to read that Donna Schmidt seconded the motion made by Tom Wiggers for the purchase of candy to welcome back teachers on their first day.

Officer Reports:

<u>Treasurer</u>: Lino Wiseman distributed reports containing the following information:

- 1. The IRS Tax Form and the Indiana Department of Revenue Tax Form were submitted on July 11, 2018.
- 2. ERTA ended the year with an excess of \$84.95 compared to \$694.19 last year.
- 3. The Hensley Account has \$27,818; therefore, money awarded to active teachers to attend conferences, workshops, etc., will last two or more years. Lino asked if the board wanted to change the amount awarded each year or keep the amount at \$10,000. If \$10,000 is awarded each of the next two years, the remaining amount could be given to UE and USI to fund scholarships. Diane Meier, who chairs the Scholarship Committee, said that the original intent of this scholarship was once the money was gone that was it.
- 4. Lino reported that Darla Olberding had audited the books on August 1, 2018, and found them to be in order.

<u>Community Service</u>: Pat Claybaugh announced that forms for listing volunteer hours will be distributed at the October luncheon and collected at the December luncheon.

<u>Fellowship/Necrology</u>: Judy Isaac said that members should send an address along with the name when a card is to be sent.

<u>Membership</u>: Darlene Brockriede informed the board that 65 newsletters were mailed to those who don't have e-mail or who have not given us an e-mail address.

There was some discussion about how to better reach newly retired teachers. A number of board members had contacted new retirees before the school year ended. Walt reported that he had sent a letter to each new retiree during the summer.

<u>Programs</u>: President-Elect Steve Fritz announced programs that are already scheduled. Jo Frohbieter-Mueller and Jim Zelle will provide a program featuring Civil War era music at the August meeting. Jed Medler, who heads the ETFCU Fraud Division, will speak in October. Sharon Sorenson, a retired teacher, will speak on "The Miracle of Migration" in March. Dr. Becker, the Dean of the new IU Medical School, will speak in May. The program for December is yet to be determined.

Publicity: Walt introduced and welcomed Doris Beard, who is now chair of this committee.

<u>Reservations</u>: Diana Luck reported 139 reservations at this time. Steve Fritz said that Wolf's will caterer the luncheon.

<u>IRTA Liaison/Legislative</u>: Diane Meier noted that we will receive a stipend this year in September but added that we haven't received a COLA since 2007. She reminded us that Indiana has borrowed from the Retirement Fund. Gov. Daniels did pay back some of the money, but much is still owed.

Historian: Darla Olberding informed the board that the ERTA Archives are stored at Willard Library.

Information Items:

- 1. Candy will be delivered to the schools on August 6, 2018, to welcome the teachers back on their first official day.
- 2. Frog Follies will take place on August 24-26, 2018.
- 3. The Fall Workshop for Areas 8 and 9 will held at the Career and Tech Center in Evansville on October 8, 2018.

Announcement: The next ERTA Board Meeting will be on Thursday, October 4, 2018.

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 2:25 p.m.
